THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING

Okay, I know – corny, right? Certainly not original. But, as I thought about creating this message, this is what was whispered in my ear.

In 2015, TRWE disbursed over \$39,300 for expenses. Most of these expenses were related directly to the Spring and Fall Walks. Receipts of over \$40,500 were received. Although most of the receipts were from Pilgrims and Team members to cover the expenses of the walk, members of the community also contributed over \$6,500 in donations at Gatherings, for Scholarships, and to assist other Team members and Pilgrims.

Tax receipts have been distributed to those who gave donations of \$100 or more. The IRS only requires receipts for amounts donated of \$250 or more, so, for those who gave below this threshold, your cancelled check or other records should suffice.

On behalf of the Board and those Team members and Pilgrims who were blessed by your gifts, I want to say "Thank you". YOUR gifts have made it possible for these individuals to experience the gift of Agape and the Holy Spirit by participating in the Walk weekend. To those who have been blessed, I pray that you will use the result of these gifts to further your 4th Day Walk and to continue to grow in your faith development and in serving as a Christian Leader in your Church and your community.

Embrace this gift, and keep on giving.
May God bless you in your 4th Day.

FROM THE COMMUNITY SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR...

What About Fourth Day? During our Walk we all heard more than once about our Fourth Day. Many of us have recommitted ourselves to a closer walk with the Lord, to study the Word more, to increase our prayer life, and/or to do some degree of mission field work, just to name a few. But what about the other ways in which we should be living out our Fourth Day?

When we look at the story of Emmaus, as it is recorded in Luke 24:13-25, there is a sense of community that threads its way through the verses. The story begins with two men walking before Jesus joins them. I think there is something very important in that particular reality. No one is to make this journey alone. Here we have two men walking along the road discussing what had happened in the past days. As they spoke together, as the two gathered speaking of the name of Jesus, there Jesus came alongside them. In Matthew 18:20 (NLT), Jesus says, "For where two or three gather together as my followers, I am there among them." Right here this promise is lived out. These two men were in mourning. They were reflecting. They may have even been praying. One thing is for certain; they were in

need. One could argue that they were worshipping along that road, and in the very midst of their corporate worship, Jesus came and offered them comfort.

There is another point in the story. When they arrived at their home, Jesus appeared to be continuing on. They urged him to stay with them. Jesus accepted that invitation and in the midst of their time together, Christ's fullness was revealed to them. Again, there is a sense of community. This time it was not that Jesus caught up to them and joined them, but that the men invited Jesus into their home, into their company. Jesus will never refuse such an invitation.

Sometimes I can look too deeply into God's Word and I find myself buried in the minute details, but here I thank you for humoring me for these moments. Are there still parts of our life in which we leave Jesus outside of the door? Are there those places into which Jesus is simply not invited to participate? For whatever reason we all seem to have those places in our life. But what if it is in those places that Jesus will reveal himself more fully, in the same profound way that he did before the Emmaus travelers?

Beyond that, sometimes we forget that it is in the midst of community that Jesus says he will be "among us". That does not mean that on our own Jesus is not present. What it does mean is that there is something very special about being in community, special to us and to Christ. The Walk to Emmaus encourages everyone to grow in their spiritual life through worship and participation in the local church. These are not solitary things. We are also encouraged to become active in our discipleship throughout the world, this too is not a solitary thing. Remember on your Walk, you were not dropped off in an empty room but a room full of people. The first night you met a new friend, and the entire weekend was wrapped within community. Funny, after the Walk is complete each of us was celebrated as a new member of the Emmaus Community! There is not a single aspect of Emmaus that is done in isolation.

Remaining in community is one of the most beautiful elements that is woven throughout the Scriptures. The Emmaus Community celebrates this reality through reunion groups, monthly gatherings, teaming (including the prayer vigil, fourth day servers and helpers, along with the "at camp" team), the sharing and lifting of prayer concerns, the celebration of members of the community when they go home to glory, send off, closing, candlelight, and so many more ways that Emmaus reclaims the call for us to be in community. I hope to see you soon...

“I HAVE DECIDED TO FOLLOW JESUS,...NO TURNING BACK, NO TURNING BACK”

With team members from Walks 97 and 98 enthusiastically leading us in song, the March Gathering at Dutilh began!

Our 4th day speaker was Robert Dippolito who blessed us and inspired us with a message about how the Walk to Emmaus has changed his life and continues to have an impact on him. His awareness of the Holy Spirit guiding him as a pilgrim and into his 4th day journey was shared with humor, but the depth of his faith and trust was evident.

Team Commissioning and the Memorial Service were on the agenda, but this time, under Pastor Scott Gallagher’s leadership, were done within the worship service making both of these activities an act of praise. During the time for the Offering, team members came forward and were commissioned – then prayers were offered, not only for the gifts of money, but also for the gifts and service willingly given by the men and women of Walks 97 and 98.

The memorial service for 14 of our departed members was a collective act of remembrance and prayer. As a name was read, friends and family came forward to light a candle and offer a prayer of thanksgiving for a life well-lived and now blessed to be in God’s presence.

We shared in Holy Communion and exited the sanctuary singing again our commitment to follow Jesus. Some commented that the evening was truly Spirit-filled, and, indeed, it was.

The next Gathering is April 16 just prior to Men’s Candlelight. Fellowship begins at 7, Gathering program at 7:30. Come, worship with us, pray for the pilgrims by name and then greet them in the name of Jesus as they continue building a closer relationship with the God of agape love!

WHY IS IT SO HARD TO SAY YES?

When I was asked by a total stranger to consider going on the Walk to Emmaus, I immediately answered, YES. When I was asked to serve on team, I immediately answered, YES. When I was asked to serve on team in a leadership role, I hesitated, prayed on it, and answered, YES. The first time I was asked to serve on the Board of Directors, I immediately thought of all of the reasons why I couldn't do it...I was too busy and said, NO. Then I prayed on it, talked it over with my wife, spent a week thinking about it and tried to say, YES, but it was too late. Someone else had filled the position.

The second time I was asked to be on the Board, I again thought of all of the reasons why I couldn't do it...I was too busy and said, NO (when will I learn?). I prayed on it overnight and called back to say, YES. This time I was quick enough and the position hadn't been filled. There is a decision-making process that goes along with Emmaus requests for service that is both important and critical not to be circumvented. It goes something like this: (1) caller: "Would you consider....?" (2) "Before you answer, please pray on it and get back to me." (3) Prayerful consideration. (4) Call back with "YES, here am I Lord, send me, use me;" or with a carefully, prayerfully considered "NO, but maybe next time when I'm not so busy."

My morning prayer and meditation time ends with "As the call comes, here am I Lord send me, use me." And yet I still respond to the call with a NO at times, and later regret that decision. I ask you to please consider serving the Lord by serving on an Emmaus team, serving others at Emmaus functions, or serving in a leadership role when the call comes. You won't regret it. In fact, you will be enriched by it. That I can attest to from experience. There is still time to serve on the upcoming walk by signing up on the prayer list, coming up as 4th Day help, attending send off and candlelight, and/or contributing agape for the pilgrims and the team.
