

That's my typical experience: huge reaction and desire to act followed by inevitable letdown.

But this time, the letdown was followed by insight and joy. I belong to a Covenant Discipleship Group at my church, which is much like a reunion group, so I was already committed to devotions, worship, action, study. My personal study led me to readings that brought home to me again and again that God loves me just the way I am. Hockey is Life; Christ is Eternity!

Hockey? Christianity? At the worst, some might see these as complete opposites. Or perhaps more often, folks would just not see any connection at all. But for those who know hockey and know Christ -- well, they know better! Of course there is a connection! And with the grace of God, that connection will come into focus for up to 100 youth hockey players this summer in the North Hills, as Hockey Ministries International sponsors its first Christian Hockey Camp at the Warrendale Bladerunners.

Last summer, a group of Christian parents from a local youth hockey team began a search for a Christian hockey camp for their players. They found several camps – but for older kids – and the camps were several hours away. So they began to trade emails and to pray about the possibilities of creating the right camp for younger players right here in Pittsburgh. In the early fall, they connected with Hockey Ministries International – a non-profit ministry to connect hockey players, coaches and parents with Christ. HMI has existed for 27 years, and last year ran 27 camps across the world.

With the help and support of HMI, the original group of parents (now the "planning board"!), has created a unique Christian experience for the young hockey players of Western Pennsylvania. The Pittsburgh Christian Hockey Camp is focused on hockey players age 6 to 13. The camp will take place July 26 through July 30, 2004. There is room for nearly 100 players. The camp is primarily a day camp, with one overnight stay per age group (the players will be divided into three age groups). The camp will feature 3 hours of ice time per day, coached by professional, trained Christian coaches – some of whom will be former NHL and NCAA players. Off-ice activities will occur at the Family Retreat Center in Warrendale (a 5 minute ride from the rink) and will include arts & crafts, canoeing, hiking, other sports, bonfires, etc. And of course there will be a full spiritual program throughout. including prayer, devotion time, small group discussions, worship and witness from positive Christian mentors.

The Emmaus community can help this camp in several ways. The camp needs churches to pray for, and perhaps even financially support the camp. They also accept tax-deductible private and corporate donations. In fact, to date they have received almost \$10,000 in corporate sponsorships.

Counselors are also needed. Counselors should be age 15 and up, be practicing Christians and be able to donate their time to the camp. Several churches are considering donating a summer intern or seminarian to the camp to act as a counselor for the week. The counselors do not have to know or play hockey.

And of course, campers are needed! The camp is filling quickly, so if you know youth hockey players who are interested, please have them contact the camp hotline right away.

Everyone has heard the joke: "I went to a boxing match and a hockey game broke out!" Well, with God's help this summer, you might just hear about "some kids who went to a hockey camp and a worship service broke out!" Please keep this camp and the campers in your prayers – and remember the motto of the camp: "Hockey is life; Christ is Eternity."

Sponsorship – The most important job of all

The Walk to Emmaus is a wonderful renewing spiritual experience, which is made possible through the faithful efforts of sponsors who would like to share the joy that came from their weekend experience.

The strength of any Emmaus Community is a direct result of that community's sponsoring practices. The whole experience of a pilgrim is impacted by how they first hear about a Walk to Emmaus and how they experience the agape acts that bring them to register for and ultimately attend an Emmaus weekend.

Recruiting

The purpose of an Emmaus walk is to equip Christian disciples who will help change the world. It is designed for spiritual renewal, for learning and sharing in an atmosphere of ecumenical Christian community. Understanding the central purpose of the Walk to Emmaus will help you as you select candidates you wish to sponsor. Keep in mind that a walk is not intended to be a converting experience but rather a confirming/reaffirming time.

Ten Steps of Sponsorship

- 1) <u>Pray</u> Your prayers should focus on how God's kingdom can become a greater reality in your candidate's lives (not how you can persuade them to attend a weekend).
- 2) <u>Make an appointment</u> In the case of a married couple, be sure to talk with both husband and wife. Explain the Emmaus program, including events of the weekend and also the ongoing nature of Emmaus through group reunions and community gatherings. You will want to mention the singing, times of fun and worship, and the talks on Christian life.
- 3) Extend the invitation This is an invitation to a more vital relationship with Jesus Christ, not just to a weekend event.
- 4) <u>Seek a commitment</u> Accept their commitment by having them fill out the registration form in your presence. Complete the sponsor's section on the back including the signature of the candidate's pastor, then return the registration forms and deposit to the community registrar, Peg Nicholas.
- 5) <u>Continue to pray, prepare agape, enlist pastoral support</u> Your job is just beginning. Stay in touch, be available to answer questions, collect Agape letters, speak to candidate's pastor to ask for support through prayers.
- 6) Support the walk You will want to provide transportation, plan to arrive before 7:00 pm. You may wish to provide supper before arriving. Help your candidate through registration, carry luggage to their sleeping quarters and familiarize them with the facilities. Attend sponsor's hour to support your candidate in prayer or have someone to fill in for you if you are on team. Remember, minimal contact during the walk, if you should encounter them while serving. You have a responsibility to your pilgrim's family as well call them to see if they need help during your candidate's absence. Show support by participating in the prayer vigil, attending Candlelight, and Closing. These things are a witness to the love of God through Christian community. Following Closing, you are responsible to help gather your candidate's belongings and transport them home. Invite them to attend the upcoming Mini-Gathering or Community Gathering with you.
- 7) <u>Keep in contact, help pilgrim on their Fourth Day</u> Soon after the walk, ask how their Fourth Day is going. Give them a chance to talk be a good listener. Get them off to the right start by taking them to the first gathering or two and help them to find and join a reunion group.
- 8) <u>Help your pilgrim re-enter their church</u> Help them to properly channel their newfound enthusiasm about being a disciple.
- 9) <u>Help your pilgrim serve the Emmaus community</u> They may want to sign up for the 72-hour prayer vigil, make agape gifts, or offer fourth-day service for the next set of walks. Encourage them to fill out the Fourth Day Participation Sheet they received in their Sunday packets.
- 10) <u>Help your pilgrim to sponsor others</u> Sponsoring comes full circle when you help the person you sponsored sponsor their first pilgrims. Help them with the Ten Steps of Sponsorship the first time through.

Yes, sponsoring comes with a great deal of responsibility; you need to be sure that you are prepared before you begin the process. Sponsorship also has great rewards. You can share God's love with people you know by sponsoring them for an Emmaus weekend.
