Early one morning a Team member happened to be walking through the kitchen and noticed that the coffee pot was not plugged in. Trying to be helpful, this team member (whose job was NOT to take care of the coffee pots) plugged it in. Unfortunately, there was no water in the coffee pot. The pot overheated and caught fire. In one version of this folklore, an entire town was burned to the ground and wiped off the map. (No one was harmed by the way.)

So, the moral of the story: don't drink coffee.... Actually, the message of this story is that, as part of a team, we all have our roles to play. When we start to take on responsibilities that we are not trained for or for things for which we don't have all the information, even though our intentions are good, we can create havoc and unfortunate results.

This is a valuable message... for building teamwork...for building trust. But what's the REST of the story?

There is another famous quote: "If not me, then who? If not now, then when?" This quote has been attributed by many sources to many famous people from Mikhail Gorbachev to Ivanka Trump. The source of this message is unimportant. What I do want to suggest is that when our "It's not my coffee pot" message becomes a justification for not using our gifts or talents, time or resources to further God's mission, then we are missing a wonderful opportunity to show Christ's love.

When we see someone who is hurting or in need, if WE don't offer a kind word, a gentle hug, or other support, then whom do we expect to do so? When our Church needs individuals to welcome guests, to care for children in the nursery so their parents can worship, or serve on leadership committees to help guide the Church, and we don't step forward, then whom do we expect to fill those needs? When we see someone who is ready for an opportunity to grow spiritually and don't offer to sponsor them on a Walk to Emmaus, then whom do we expect to offer that opportunity? When our TRWE community is in need of individuals to serve on Team, offer 4th day support, serve on the Board, offer Agape to pilgrims, or join the Prayer vigil, and we don't answer the call, whom do we expect to be Christ's hands and feet?

So, although we need to avoid plugging in someone else's coffee pot, we ARE called to serve.

BOOK ENDS

When any story is told, and retold, there are elements that surround it. Those elements directly influence, add details, and can even increase the understanding of the story. I call those elements "book ends". The story of the encounter along the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) is not exempt from that reality. If you may humor me for a moment, I would like to share with you some revelations and traditions about the persons involved in the encounter.

There were two disciples walking along the road to Emmaus who encountered Jesus. We are only given one name, Cleopas. There is a long-standing question about who the other disciple was. Tradition points to Cleopas' companion being his wife, Mary. Why would we think this was his wife and that her name is Mary? Well, we have to turn to the Gospel of John for that, "Mary the wife of Clopas" (John 19:25). Clopas is another way of spelling Cleopas. Mark 15:40-41 adds further detail to this Mary by saying, "Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joseph, and Salome." We then find what seems to be this same Mary with the women going to the tomb early that first Easter morning, "When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles." (Luke 24:9-10)

Let us go with the tradition and analysis of the Early Church Fathers and many modern scholars and say that the two on the road to Emmaus were Cleopas and his wife Mary. This will be our first book-end. What does this tell us? Cleopas and Mary were aware of not only the events in Jerusalem, but had seen, known, and experienced Jesus. They were gathered with the core group of disciples and Mary was close enough (along with their daughter Salome) to go to the tomb early in the morning. Yet, the message of the Resurrection brought back from the empty tomb by the women was dealt with so out of hand, and dismissed, that Cleopas and Mary began the journey home filled with a sense of defeat, Cleopas in his unbelief and Mary in her disbelief in the rejection of her shared testimony. Maybe, just maybe, this was the discussion they were having along the road and later with Jesus.

After the revelation at the dinner table, Cleopas and Mary returned to Jerusalem to share their experience. The others had also experienced Jesus. Suddenly, Jesus entered into their company. This return to Jerusalem, the shared testimony, and the communal encounter with Jesus is our other bookend. I would like to say that the story is then complete, but this has all now become part of the story and so what are the new book ends of this larger story? This is what Bible Study is and does...it challenges, grows, and speaks to our current state.

So, what does this larger understanding say to us today? Reflect back to your experience prior to your Walk. Chances are we had all had a relationship with Christ, we had experienced the cross, the empty tomb, and had participated in ministry (like Mary's witness). But, as with all Christians there comes a time when we grow stagnate, the weight of the world's problems, life experiences, etc...draw us away from that closeness. In a way we all slowly turn and begin the road back home to where we began, we remember and share, but something is different, something has crept into our faith. Then we experience the Walk to Emmaus, we encounter Christ anew, refreshed, and we once again see Him clearly.

We rush back to our churches to share our experience. Sometimes we are met as Cleopas and Mary with open arms of shared testimony. Sometimes we are met with disbelief. And sometimes we are met with apathy. In any case our experience needs to be shared, Cleopas and Mary rushed back and shared, they did not know how it would be received (when they had left before they faced disbelief). When we come back to our churches we need to not only share our experience, but enable others to experience the same.

Maybe Jesus will walk into the space in which you are sharing. Or maybe, just maybe, your role is to sponsor someone for a walk so that they may have their own Emmaus experience. It is also important to know that the Walk to Emmaus is for persons who have experienced Jesus, just like Cleopas and Mary had...it is to expand and grow our faith and leadership.

It is also important to remember that we don't see or hear of Cleopas or Mary again in the New Testament. Sponsoring, serving on team, serving as fourth day help, and all the other ways in which we can support the community are not for recognition, but for the Glory of God.

DEVOTIONS

If you are like me, you get exposed to numerous devotions during Lent. I'm typically reading four devotions a day, three that appear in my email and one that I read daily from *These Days*, the Presbyterian version of *The Upper Room*. Each of the readings provides a reflection on a different Bible passage with suggestions for daily spiritual application. Most of the time I consider those suggestions and discard them for one reason or another; but occasionally, I decide to make an effort that day to apply the message that resonated with me.

As members of the Emmaus community, we often reflect on Luke 24: 13-34, when Jesus appeared to two believers traveling on the road. I often liken this to the times when I feel that I have had a guide with me on the many roads that I travel. I may not recognize it at the time, but I know that I am not alone as I journey through this life.

Consider reflecting on this passage from Luke during this season of Lent. Consider what it would mean to walk with Jesus and not recognize Him. Was it your experience on the Walk to Emmaus that helped you recognize that Jesus walks with you? Think about what it would mean to help others open their eyes to the Jesus who walks with them. Now consider acting on this reflection by sponsoring a pilgrim on the next Walk.
