Dave and I are part of a small group studying the book *God is My CEO – Following God's Principles in a Bottom-Line World* by Larry Julian. Though its focus is for those in the business community, much of its message could be applied to us as individuals and even to us as an Emmaus Community.

Julian says that a successful personal business plan is a partnership with God, a daily walk with God one decision at a time, one day at a time. He says he was profoundly affected by a CEO who taught him to make the most out of each day by asking, "Are you willing to put your signature on this day?"

Isn't that good advice for us – are we living a life in partnership with God and making the most of the gift of each day He gives us? Likewise, isn't this good advice for our Community – are we in partnership with God to make the most of the gift of each Emmaus event He gives us?

On page 249 of the book, Julian gives four attitudes that will help make each day a signature day.

Appreciation – Lord, thank you for the gift of this day. Regardless of circumstances, good or bad, I thankfully accept all that is in this day.

Availability – I'm totally available to You and, therefore, available to others.

Awareness – I understand You communicate through the people and circumstances that surround me. I further recognize that the closer I come to You, the more I can hear Your whisper through people and circumstances. Therefore, I commit to my awareness of Your presence over the busyness of life.

Alignment – My goal is to be one with You. Every decision I make and all I do reflects your nature.

I believe that as we pray for strength to incorporate these attitudes into our individual lives, they will transfer collectively as we partner with God to fulfill the plans He has for the TRWE Community. God Bless, Lill Griffith TRWE #28 Table of Sarah

Sponsorship: The Most Important Job of All From the *Upper Room Handbook* on *Emmaus*:

Most communities take sponsorship for granted; we assume that everyone knows the how and why of sponsorship. Yet sponsorship is the most important job in the Emmaus community. It is more than "signing up people." The value of being educated about the value of good sponsorship cannot be over emphasized. The quality of sponsorship influences pilgrims, our community, the health of the Emmaus movement and the churches affected by the movement.

Good sponsorship is the first act of agape before a Walk ever begins; the experience of the Walk for a Pilgrim really begins with how we handle sponsorship.

Good sponsorship undergirds the whole weekend with sacrificial love on behalf of each Pilgrim. Sponsors are to use discernment in recruiting Pilgrims. A sponsor embodies the personal commitment of the community to their Pilgrim and provides personal acts of agape during the three days for their Pilgrim. These acts of agape include, prayer, agape letters, presence at Candlelight and Closing and follow up. Follow up is needed for activities such as finding a Reunion group and attendance at gathering.

Good sponsorship becomes the foundation for a healthy effective Emmaus Movement that is fulfilling its true purpose; the development of Christian leaders and the renewal of the church in ministry. Wood and Roy write in *Day Four; The Pilgrim's Continued Journey*, "The strength of any Emmaus Community is a direct result of that community's recruiting practices. If the community is committed to recruiting strong church leaders for the purpose of strengthening the local church, then the community will be a strong, vital force in the renewal movement."

Why do we sponsor? What is our aim? The aim of a sponsor should not be "to get all my friends to go" to fill up the three day event, to fix people's problems, or to reproduce one's own religious experience in others. Rather, the aim of the sponsor is to bring spiritual revitalization to Christians, who in turn, will bring new life and vision to the work of the church in the congregation, home, workplace, and community.
