I went to my Bible concordance and found thirty-five scriptural references for *peace*. I scanned a few texts on peace and found two words that jumped out at me, *trust and obedience*. My experience is that peace comes from trust and obedience Has that been your experience also?

Nothing compares to the simplicity and the complexity of God's word. Please rejoice with me knowing that the word of God allows us to fail and still find peace in the gospel of Jesus Christ.

EVER WONDER HOW A TEAM IS SELECTED????

A committee that serves our community in the background is our Team Selection Committee. The committee is chaired by the Assistant Community Lay Director. In addition it is made up of two to three community members at large, the walk Lay Director, the Registrar, the Community Spiritual Director and the Community Lay Director. This committee meets at least 120 prior days prior to a set of Walks to initiate team selections. The Walk Lay Directors may choose to bring potential selections for team discerned through prayer or may depend entirely on the committee team selection process.

The most important factor in team selection is prayer-- who are the persons the Committee Members have discerned God to lay on their hearts. Some factors considered are Emmaus community and church involvement, reunion group participation and living the Christian lifestyle of piety, study and action. The model for progressive servanthood from the Emmaus handbook is followed. Armed with this information each Lay Director puts together God's team, coming back to the Team Selection Committee as needed.

What a team is not made up of is a Lay Director's friends and favorite people. In the early years of our 12 year old community, members often served our community by being on successive teams. Thanks to their commitment to Christian Service with their efforts and sacrifices, we have the community we do today. Now with a more mature community, the development of a healthy vibrant community commands that team participation be spread to reflect a cross section of OUT community, coming from different churches, different areas of Western Pa., different denominations, ages and experience levels. The result is seldom will any community members be asked to serve on consecutive teams.

When our community does a set of walks there is an invitation and a need for every community member to participate in some role of service.

HOW TO BE A GOOD SPONSOR

You can share God's love with someone you know by sponsoring them for an Emmaus weekend. There are, however, a few things to keep in mind about the responsibilities that go along with sponsorship.

Who to sponsor:

The purpose of Emmaus is the renewal of the church as the body of the risen Christ in the world through the renewal of church members as faithful and committed disciples of Jesus Christ. Emmaus **EXPANDS** participants' spiritual lives, **DEEPENS** their discipleship, and **REKINDLES** their gifts as Christian leaders in their churches and communities. The Emmaus experience is for <u>active Christians</u> and <u>members of churches</u> whose renewal will mean new energy, commitment, and vision in the church and everyday environments. Emmaus is not intended for pilgrims to meet Jesus for the very first time – it is not a converting experience, but rather a confirming/reaffirming time.

How to sponsor:

First, pray for a new vitality for your pilgrim's faith. Make an appointment to talk to both husband and wife if married. Explain the walk as best you can. You don't need to tell every detail, but keep no secrets. Mention the singing, the times of fun, times of worship, the talks on Christian life, and the relationships you made at your walk with God and other Christians. Bring a copy of the registration form and encourage them to fill it out while they are thinking about it. Sometimes the walks fill up early so sending the registration form and \$25 deposit to the registrar is important.

Your responsibilities will include: staying in touch with your pilgrim before and after the walk; informing them of what to pack for their weekend; collecting 12 letters from people close to them; providing transportation for them to and from the walk; getting them set up in their cabin upon arrival at camp; attending send-off, candlelight service, and closing; and praying. It is highly recommended that you have your name on the prayer vigil for your pilgrim's walk. As a sponsor, you should also provide agape. If you come to camp as a fourth-day volunteer, give your pilgrim space to experience his or her own emotions – keep your distance. Be cordial, but save the hugs for after closing. After closing, gather up all your pilgrim's belongings, and give them a chance to talk on the way home. Make sure you encourage them to join you at the mini and monthly gatherings and continue to pray for them.

A word of encouragement

Ultimately, God calls pilgrims to the Emmaus Walk. If you invite someone and they don't immediately share your excitement, don't be too discouraged. God's timing is perfect, but it doesn't always fit into our human plans. Pray for discernment and trust God to choose the right pilgrims for each walk.

When I look back it seems I missed a lot on my walk and that is why it's so important to have been on team to pick up and reinforce the things I missed or that didn't sink in. My walk was quite an emotional experience but as time went on the love of the Lord took on a much deeper meaning, love became much more of an action word and I see it in a lot of other Emmaus people that I have come to know.

I love the people of Emmaus and what they bring to each of their respective churches. I have never been in groups before Emmaus where we share our concerns, our families and our lives in such a way that I never have before experienced and in those times of joy it's like experiencing a little piece of heaven.

What Emmaus has done for me is to make me more aware of what an awesome God we serve and the challenges He puts in front of me and as long as I keep my eyes on Jesus, trust in him and be obedient to Him, He will always carry me through the tough times ahead for all the rest of my fourth days. **DeColores – Rob Dangel TRWE #7 Table of Zephaniah**
